Being Blessed When It Appears There's Nothing There

What a month God has in store for us. We have entered into a new Advent season and a new Advent theme of "Hush The Noise: Join the Love Song.' Each week we will hear some very thought provoking takes on this Advent theme. We also have several Bible Studies running so I do hope you will avail yourself of one of these.

I'm just a bit hyped up because we have spent several weeks reading the book of Genesis for our Bible study which we have finished, but more than that I have spent the week with Hannah. Well, if you don't know the story of Hannah go read **1 Samuel chapters 1 and 2** God has been on fire in my head and heart. I will give you a quick re-cap of events in the life of Hannah. When we are introduced to Hannah, we are told that she is one of the wives of Elkanah, and he loves her more than the other wife, but here's the rub, Hannah is barren. God has closed her womb, but not that of the other wife who is pouring out children like milk poured out on breakfast cereal.

As you may know if you were a woman who had not provided your husband with children you were belittled, taunted, made fun of, had fingers pointed at you, and just all around bullied by others. And this was certainly the case with wife #2 Peninnah. She provoked Hannah to the point of tears and emotional distress. Hannah is socially disgraced, emotionally depressed and spiritually disturbed.

Every year Elkanah took the whole family to the temple at Shiloh to do the customary burnt offering. And every year Hannah would go to the temple to pray to God to be given a male child. And each year her prayers went unanswered until the time of God's choosing.

As I said, Hannah is socially disgraced, emotionally depressed and spiritually disturbed. If we listen carefully, we can hear this echo the life of Mary. A young girl who accepts the will of God on her life to bring the divinely conceived son of God into the world. Hannah was not unusual in the Bible as there were lots of barren women. Sarah was barren until she was 90 when she bore Isaac, the promised seed. When you do the calculations, you realize that Rebekah was barren for 20 years before Jacob, the father of Israel, was born. Before Joseph, Samson, and Samuel were born their mothers had experienced a period of barrenness. Elizabeth was old in years when she bore John the Baptist, the forerunner to Christ.

The bible is full of stories of those who experienced barrenness only to experience a greater blessing. Maybe, just maybe for some of us this Advent season that is what we need to hear from God that barrenness, that having unfulfilled places is a prelude to greater blessings.

The main lesson I learned from Hannah is that things happen in God's time. Jesus came to earth at the appointed time. God allowed Hannah to become pregnant at the right time for Samuel to be instrumental in the temple.

Our inability, our sense of helplessness and hopelessness are not barriers to God working in our lives. They are not barriers to God's blessings but may be the very props God uses to bring us in our brokenness before God's throne of grace that we might be blessed.

God's work began not just in the barrenness of Hannah's life but also in the distress of her life. And I believe this may be true for Mary and Joseph as well. The God who brought fruitfulness out of a barren womb in the life of Hannah is the same God who will bring fruitfulness out of the barren place of your life.

The key in all of it I believe was that Hannah turned to God in prayer. In her grief and anguish, she poured her soul out to the Lord God Almighty. Through her God raised up Samuel who was to anoint the kings of Israel and prepare the way for the King of kings to come.

I think there is a challenge here for us all. In our barren places, in our grief and anguish who will we turn to? "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." Isaiah 9:6 We should not allow the taunts of others to distract us from the presence of the Lord. The answer is found in turning to God in prayer. Maybe even through the tears of our hearts to lift them to God and to trust God to bring fruitfulness and blessing out of our barren places.

Thank you, Lord, for being everything we need at all times. We can count on you to guard our steps, bless the path ahead of us, and carry us when our strength is gone. Amen.

May your Advent season be filled with less noise so you can hear the angels proclaim, "Glory to God in highest heaven, and peace on earth to those with whom God is pleased." Luke 2:14 Merry Christmas and may God bless you real good!

Sue Rickerby shares an update since Shaun Rickerby went to Ecudor

Here is a summary of the last 6 months! He settled into Ecuador very well and has been able to rent a house for himself near to where his fiancée (Salome) lives. Yes, they became engaged in August. He has also found a job teaching at a prestigious school, he is teaching Maths but he is teaching in English, in accordance with the school's policy. The children are around GCSE age but the school will set their own exams. Most of the children speak Spanish as their first language but have learned lots of English as it is an important language for them.

There has been a bit of a set back to this as on 1 November Shaun, Salome (Salo), her father and brother were involved in a bad car accident which was the fault of another driver. Shaun has fractured a T10 vertebra and a rib. He was able to have an operation on his back, carried out by the top specialist in the country (in a private hospital). Salo had lots of soft tissue injuries but no broken bones, her dad has 7 fractured ribs and her brother has around 12 fractures including leg and arm. (Her mum was out of the country, I think visiting relatives). All the patients are out of hospital and staying at Salo's parent's house, complete with various equipment and nurses, so it is like a mini hospital.

Shaun can now walk indoors but gets very tired, he can't do things like shower by himself or cook a meal. The others are recovering well too and they have tremendous support from friends and neighbours and the various churches they have all been involved in. It will be at least another couple of months before Shaun can think about going back to work but the school appear to be very keen to keep his job open for him.

Unity Advent Theme 2024

As usual this year we will be following a theme throughout our Advent services. 70 years of memories from Norma Cradock

Firstly I would like to thank everyone who came to my special occasion in October. It was just lovely to see you all. Especially I want to thank PJ who so generously shared her service with me. I spoke then of the many wonderful people who guided and supported me over the years but there are some other stories there was not time to tell-so here they are with a repeat of some of the things I did say that morning

I spoke about my dear little Sunday school



teacher Mrs Harris a tiny lady whose feet didn't touch the floor as she sat on an adult size chair. We spent many a happy hour watching those tiny feet swing back-and-forth as she told us about Jesus. Little did I know then that I would have a daughter called Mrs Harris one day. One very special thing that she did for us was to give us every week a small illustrated text that we

called Mrs Harris one day. One very special thing that she did for us was to give us every week a small illustrated text that we had to place in our bibles in the correct place. As a result we knew our way around both Old and New testaments as few children did then and I fear still fewer today.

It was the Sunday School secretary, Mr Farley, who suggested to me, when I was just 16, that I should ask for 'A Note to Preach'. I thought he was joking because although I had taken several Sunday School sessions and spoken at adult services and guild meetings, all the preachers in the Circuit seemed to me to be not only very old, but for the most part male. However the Leaders' Meeting, as we called the Church Council in those days, supported the request and so I went ahead. The Superintendent Minister was a really lovely man called Dr Alfred Lamb. He was a great preacher and very academic. I believe he had seven different degrees. He sent me an actual note, which he said I must carry with me whenever I preached, presumably because he

thought I was so young I might be challenged. He told me too, that an asterisk would appear beside the name of the preacher who was to supervise me during my 'On note' period. "It will be" he said, "the first, but I hope not the last, time you appear as a Star on the plan". Later he sent me to the Circuit church, Easling Broadway, which was very grand and knew it. Dr Lamb said to me with conspiratorial grin 'hold 'em over the pit Norma. You'll get away with it, but I wouldn't dare.'

and we fell in love, and all talk of young ministers was silenced.

It was Mr Kembray who was to be my mentor. It was rather a scary thought, because he was very much of the old school. He dressed very formally in pinstripe trousers with what I think was called a cutaway coat, a shirt with a butterfly collar and a silk cravat with a pearl tie pin. I needn't have been scared. In one evening he taught me how to construct a service, how to write a prayer and how to choose hymns (not just my favourites). He then sent me away to do my first Order of Service. At my parents' insistence I wrote "Address" rather than "Sermon". I think they were always afraid that I would become conceited and they thought Sermon was too pretentious a word. But when I showed Mr Kembray he did not approve. He said wagging his finger sternly, "your address is where you live; you will be preaching a SERMON, and don't you forget it". Dear Mr Kembray I hope I never did.

After that first quarter I was moved to On Trial. Mr George Howell became my Supervisor, and I began my studies. I was also studying A-level religious education at the time and learned later that I could have been exempted from the local preacher exams. I'm glad I wasn't because the two worked so well together. All the study in those days was done by correspondence course. My Old Testament tutor was the Reverend W Dean Turner. He really opened the Scriptures for me, and I learned to love the Old Testament in a way that I had never done before. Having completed Old and New Testament and Christian Doctrine exams and preached my trial sermon, just

before my 19th birthday I was received onto full plan. Immediately, ladies in the Circuit, started saying now we must find a nice young minister for Norma. She would be such a help to him and she could run the sisterhood. Well, with all due respect to the many lovely women I've known who were ministers wives, to be married to a nice young minister and run the sisterhood was not the summit of my ambitions for my life. A month or two later I met Colin, and we fell in love, and all talk of young ministers was silenced.

Round about the time we were married I was made National Wesley Guild President, and this involved travelling around the country and preaching at various guild anniversaries. It was on one such occasion that I experienced my most embarrassing moment as a preacher. It was in North Wales and we had had a lovely weekend and they were so warm and welcoming. Announcing the final hymn on the Sunday evening and wanting to pay a compliment to our hosts I found myself saying "We close with that great hymn which I and many other English people will always associate with Wales. Guide me O thou great Jehovah pilgrim through this barren land! "I wanted to unsay the words but it was too late. Fortunately though, they were so lovely that they were not offended but indeed either took it as the compliment it was meant or thought it was funny.

In 1959 we moved to Bristol because of Colin's job with the BBC. First we lived in Longwell Green and then moved here to Oldland Common, and raised our family of four girls. It was a great joy to me when in later years both Colin and our daughter Joy became local preachers themselves. Like me Colin is now retired but Joy continues to preach and I know you will forgive me if I say that Colin and I think she is one of the finest preachers in the Circuit. Another coincidence is that she was trained by Bev Harris, whose nephew Paul she later married. That of course is how she became the second Mrs Harris in my life.

One of the great privileges for me has been training new preachers. Ros Sledge, Veronica Jackson, and our own Pat

Lansdale and Lynette Skuse among them. One of my favourite stories is when Lynette came with me to Clowes (which became Summerhill). She preached a splendid sermon and after the service the steward said to us in his lovely Bristol accent "The mantle of Elijahl has fallen on Elishal. We shan't need Elijahl anymore. But as Lynette pointed out to me after the service on the 27th of October that must be 30 years ago, so I'm afraid the Circuit had to put up with Elijahl for sometime after that.



Looking back over the 70 years I remember so many lovely congregations especially those of which I have been a member. I thank them now with all my heart for all their love and support. It has been wonderful to be one of Mr Wesley's preachers. It used to say on the cover of the syllabus of studies for local preachers on trial "Show yourself to be a workman that has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the Word of Truth". These words originally addressed to Timothy (2 Timothy 2 verse 15) should be engraved on the heart of every preacher, as I hope they have been on mine.

EVENING FELLOWSHIP @ UOMC


You may remember that at the Annual Church Meeting it was requested that we have a regular evening fellowship evening on a Sunday.
