Our Ministers Message

Loving All People!

When they heard this, everyone in the synagogue was filled with anger. They rose up and ran him out of town. They led him to the crest of the hill on which their town had been built so that they could throw him off the cliff. But he passed through the crowd and went on his way. Luke 4:28-30 (CEB)

As we enter into this month that is characteristically a month of "Love" it breaks my heart to be from a country where the President is gathering up brown and black people looked upon as illegal 'criminal' immigrants and deporting them from the country.

Jesus in his hometown synagogue, proclaimed a radical message of inclusion and grace. As he reads from Isaiah, declaring that the prophets Elijah and Elisha "cared for, fed, and healed foreigners" Jesus shatters our expectations of who is "in" and who is "out" and invites us into a larger, more expansive view of God's love.

The reaction of the crowd, from being impressed by Jesus' gracious words flowing from his lips to anger and rage, mirrors our own inner turmoil when confronted with God's boundless love. We are called to examine our hearts: Where do we resist the expansive nature of God's grace? How might we, like Jesus, bring good news to those on the outskirts of our communities? Christ invites us to step beyond our limits, to recognise the sacred in the stranger, the outcast, and even in ourselves. TURNAROUND BRISTOL WINTER UPDATE

As the Unity Ambassador for Turnaround Bristol, formerly the Methodist Centre, I get regular updates as to their activity and thought you might like to know how things are progressing down in Lawrence Hill.

You will recall that not long after Christmas we had a cold snap which meant that Turnaround invoked the Severe Weather Emergency Protocol or SWEP for short! This meant that for the first week in January they were open for 24 hours, changing the day facilities each evening into a night shelter. Previously they had only enough room for 10 guests but with some rejigging, they were able to open up a total of 18 beds. This was possible due to the hard work of the Turnround staff but also volunteers who helped out during the evenings. They helped by settling the guests in and just spending time with them.

Of the people that stayed at Turnround, 2 people have moved into permanent accommodation, this fulfils their objective of providing homeless clients with a temporary shelter that is a stepping stone into a permanent home. One of these guests returned to Turnaround in mid-January and is apparently a totally different person, he is happy and healthy thanks to the support he has received.

Turnaround have an established men's and women's clothing store which occasionally needs topping up. They are asking for good quality men's clothing, suitable for clients aged between 25-30 and at the moment are looking for:

Waterproof coats Men's Trainers – sizes 8-12 Fleeces and Hoodies Jogging Bottoms Belts Back packs Good quality T Shirts

If you have any such items, we can collect them together at church and drop them down to Lawrence Hill.

They are also always on the lookout for new volunteers so if you have a few hours to spare and would like to help, please let me know and I can put you in touch with Ross.

Thank you as always for all you have done and continue to do for Turnaround. Whilst it is no longer officially a part of our Circuit, it remains a Methodist service at the heart and are grateful for the help they receive from us.

Going Down a Rabbit Hole

Delving in the lives of some Eastville Workhouse residents As mentioned in the January newsletter when transcribing and checking the registers like that of Eastville Workhouse it soon becomes apparent that certain people or families are admitted multiple times. The reasons for this and the residents' medical records were destroyed by enemy action in World War Two, but one can speculate that these people may have been unable to work for medical or mental health reasons. One cannot help delving into some of their family histories as an interesting distraction, or as we call it, Going Down a Rabbit Hole. Here are a few more such stories.

Eliza MEAD first appeared in the 1888 Eastville Workhouse Register with her children Florence (10), John (7) and Richard (4). An investigation of Eliza's journey through life showed the following:

She was born in April 1843 to Richard and Eliza HANNEY in the parish of St Nicholas in Bristol. In the 1861 census, when she was 18, Eliza was living with her mother and her older sister Elizabeth (20) at 5 Coronation Place, Back Street. The occupations of all three was given as laundress.

Eliza went on to marry George William Mead who was born and brought up at 5 Rackhay, Back Street. This road ran parallel to Coronation Place and so it would not be too far-fetched to think Eliza and George formed a relationship during childhood which continued into adulthood. A point to note is that Back Street was re-named Queen Charlotte Street which now runs from Queen Square to Baldwin Street.

Eliza and George were married at St Nicholas church on 5th July 1969. She was 26 and George 28. His occupation was a labourer and both were shown as living in Back Street. The marriage register was signed by George but Eliza was illiterate and therefore signed with a cross.

The 1871 and 1881 censuses track the couple's growing family showing six children before George's death on 28th May 1884.

There is no doubt Eliza found it difficult to live after her husband's death and had to turn to the workhouse for support not only for herself but also for her youngest three children. According to the registers the family is seen to be admitted and re-admitted for the next eight years. Records indicate that Eliza remained dependent on the workhouse until she died on 3 February 1917. Sadly, by this time Eliza is recorded as 'insane'. She had led a hard life and died anonymously at the age of 74.

Mary Ann VAUGHAN entered Eastville Workhouse on 3rd October 1869 but was later 'discharged' with the comment, 'Sent to prison 21 days'. The Bristol Daily Post reported the incident on 9th November that year with the headline, A TROUBLESOME PAUPER. It continued,

Mary Ann Vaughan, a young girl, was charged with assaulting Charlotte JENKINS, at the Clifton Union Workhouse. Complainant and the accused were both paupers, and having had a dispute about some oakum which they were engaged in picking, Vaughan fell upon Jenkins, and violently assaulted her. Mr. Rogers, the master of the workhouse, said that the prisoner had been three times previously charged with assaults upon the officers of the workhouse. The magistrates committed her for twentyone days' hard labour.

Edith [Vine] EDKINS was admitted to Ham Green Isolation Hospital on 6th April 1915 from 'Eastville Poor Law Institution' aged 20 with 'phthisis', tuberculosis. Previously, in 1901 she was living in Birmingham the daughter of Fisher (a pavement artist) and Florence (née FIELD) Edkins. Her mother died later in 1901 and her father in 1902, so at the age of 5 she was an orphan. In 1911 she was a resident of Mullers Orphanage, Ashley Down, Bristol, the census indicating that she was born in Antrim, Ireland and was training for domestic service. The Creed register for Eastville workhouse (transcribed by Shirley Hodgson) recorded that she was transferred from Birmingham workhouse on 6th April 1915 and that she gave birth to a son Godfrey on 17th May who died on 8th August. Edith herself died in November 1916 at Stapleton workhouse infirmary, still not having recovered from TB. She is buried in Ridgeway Cemetery, Eastville.

Some of the information just leaps out at you. This entry has not been researched but tells its own tale.

Martha BRAIN was admitted to Eastville workhouse in March 1903, her address being given as Northwick, near New Passage, [South Gloucestershire]. The register tells us that she was 31 years old, an Anglican and her sister was Mrs Hick who lived in the same village. Most importantly she was single but brought two of her children with her, Ruby Millicent (aged 2) and William (aged 11 months) Brain. It confirmed that the children were illegitimate but that their father was Geoffrey LAWS, a sign writer now looking for work in Ireland. If that isn't enough, it also states that Ruby was born and baptised in Manchester and William was born and baptised in Gateshead.
