It's over a year since the last trustees' visit to Nigeria but we thank God for the wonders of modern communication. Paula Dawson and I have found that monthly WhatsApp meetings with Provost Freedom Ojenya and Very Revd Janet Daramola, of Ebenta College of Health Technology help to keep us up-to-date and, we hope, encourage them. Other pairs of trustees are developing similar links with places we support - for example Edawu and Agboke, the two mental health centres in Benue State. Here is the excellent Provost Freedom at a workshop in Lagos in 2023.

Provost Freedom

The team at the mental health centre at Edawu do their best with limited resources and have had some success generating income locally to reduce their dependance on external grants, for example by rearing goats. They would like to expand the processing of cassava and yam tubers to make flour. The shared activity of preparing the tubers can also be therapeutic.

On October 27th, Winchester Road Methodist Church in Walthamstow hosted some members of the Nigeria Methodist Mission and NHCP trustees to celebrate the contribution of Mary Burgoine, the Guild and Church in support of NHCP over many years. Mary used to look after the postal sales for NHCP. 'Her' Guild and church also hold the all-comers record for donations collected via the maps, each completed with great creativity. **Thank you so much for all your support.** Your next newsletter will be in March.

You may remember that One25 support the women who are sex workers and live on the streets in various ways. They have just taken delivery on an electric van so they won't have to pay for carbon charge. This means more money can be spent supporting those in need. We can share more next month after a small group of our bakers visit One 25, later this month.

**HOME INSTEAD** provide a film afternoon on the last Thursday of the month, for older people particularly for those with or caring for people with dementia at UOMC. However all are very welcome.

#### **EASTVILLE WORKHOUSE**

For the past three years I have been involved with a team transcribing the Eastville Workhouse Creed registers. Eastville workhouse is more commonly known by its address of 100 Fishponds Road. They are called creed registers but they are really details of admissions to the workhouse which includes the entrants' religious creed and parish of abode.

In 1834 The Poor Law amendment Act was passed with the intention to end the ever increasing cost of giving payments to the poor so that they could live in their community. The parishes in England and Wales were formed into groups known as Poor Law Unions and managed by a locally elected Board of Guardians. Eastville workhouse was built in 1847 and their admission records date from 1869 and go up to 1952, but records less than 100 years old are closed for privacy.

There are 30 volumes of these admission records from 1869 up to 1899 before the format was changed. We have transcribed and published 26 of them so far, containing 89,000 records. They list the resident's name, age and class (from 1875), religion, parish of origin and date of discharge or death. The class was to indicate dietary requirements depending on whether they were fit for work or not, male or female or a juvenile, infant or a baby.

When families were admitted they were broken up, the husbands and wives lived in different quarters and the children elsewhere also.

When recording and checking the transcripts of these registers it soon becomes apparent that certain people or families were admitted multiple times. The reasons for this and the residents' medical records were destroyed in the last war, but one can speculate that these people were probably unable to work for medical or mental health reasons. One lady who I have noted was Sarah Baulch or Baulsh who lived in Clifton and is recorded over 100 times coming in. One cannot help starting down rabbit holes whilst doing this work and doing bit of family history research on the side. Sarah was baptised, in Weymouth in 1817 and her family had moved to Bristol by 1841 for reasons unknown. She never married and died in 1890 aged about 71.

Another distraction was a girl called Querina Thorne. She was admitted five times between 1887 and 1889 aged 10 to 12, seemingly alone. With that unusual first name and curious how she came to be on her own, I just had to delve into her life story. Hers and other accounts have been written up by Shirley Hodgson in Bristol's Pauper Children: Victorian Education and Emigration to Canada. She emigrated (or probably more correctly, was shipped off to) New Brunswick in 1890 Also known as Caterina and Queenie she married in 1913, had at least four children and, I hope, lived happily until her death in 1974 aged 97.

Conditions in the workhouse were harsh. At Eastville one block was for able-bodied paupers, another the infirmary (the only hospital available to the poor) and at the rear were wards for 'lunatics' and 'imbeciles'. These derogatory terms had specific meanings in Victorian times. There was also a separate block for a nursery and for women with young children. In 1867 an inspection report found a lot to criticise In the male infirmary for example, there was only one wash basin and one towel a week for each ward.


Yes, life was hard but at least our Victorian ancestors made sure that the poor had a roof over their head, a bed to sleep in and food in their bellies. Not something we are good at today. To find out more, you can visit www.workhouses.org.uk or if you think a relative of yours might have been in Eastville workhouse let me know and I'll look it up.
