At our Anniversary service a few weeks ago the preacher asked us for memories, thoughts of the last 21 years. When he initially contacted Joy, he mentioned remembering those we have lost so here are my memories.

The first two, and I cannot be precise as to when they passed on, are **Majorie and Norman**, who both sang with Brenda's choir, pre - Unity, and Norman used his good Welsh voice to wonderful effect in the hymn singing in every service.

Albert Lansdale was the organist at Bridgeyate before Unity Oldland was born and although officially retired, he did play for the occasional evening service at Unity when no one else was available. Albert enjoyed playing Handel's Largo. His wife Kath attended services at Unity Oldland for many years, brought by daughter in law Pat.

Alice Ann's passing was a huge shock to us all. She had a beautiful voice, occasionally singing solo in Church. I remember her singing "I could have Danced all night" a song very special to her as a young widow, in a concert to raise funds for our new build. She took her turn on the organ rota, played the hymn for Wesley Guild and the piano for Praise services with Bob & Brenda.

**Bob** played and sang solo occasionally at Wesley Guild, but more often he played and he and Brenda sang together, maybe at Guild or a Praise service. He had a lovely voice and was very talented.

**David** also had a lovely voice and when he sang in Church, with Reg next to him, they sang a beautiful tenor line which richly blessed our congregation's singing. Maureen & I both agree that it was a wonderful experience to be playing and hearing the Pullin brothers contributing in such a way

**Monica s**ang with the Community Choir but I mention her here because she sold all the tickets for the Fund Raising concerts.

When Gordon Hayley played and the Silver Ring Choir sang, it was Monica who handled all the tickets for both occasions. Like all the others I mention, she did other things too but I am focusing on the music.

Lastly, but by no means least, is the *reluctant accompanist*. **Gwyneth** could play the piano but she did her best not to publicly and only played for an evening service if the Church was really desperate.

We have lost other people too, Naomi & Maurice, Joan King, Sheila Read, Greta Teale, Marie Williams, Margaret Williams, Jane Allinson, Connie, Maureen lost Brian, Susan lost Kevin and June lost Gordon but as I said at the outset on this occasion my focus is on the musicians. ### An Update from Turnaround Bristol

## Summer is here!

Dear All,

Firstly, I wanted to say a huge thank you for all your support this past year (if you can believe it we've been Turnaround for over a year now) as we ventured out into the unknown. Your enthusiasm, encouragement, and support have meant the world to all of the staff, volunteers and trustees at the centre, but most of all, our guests really do appreciate everything you've done and been doing for Turnaround - because of your support, they still have a place to come and get support, to have a wash, clean their clothes and get the access to services that without this place would be really challenging for them.

As a manager, looking back at what could have happened (closure of the centre before Turnaround came to fruition; the prospect of staff being made redundant, of a 100 year legacy being thrown in the bin, it's incredible to see how we literally turned around, righted this sinking ship and got it sailing in the direction it is now

It was recently our birthday (Turnaround), which also coincided with volunteer appreciation week, and so we had a little celebration before we opened for the day. I had created little certificates for our hard-working volunteers and we sat around and discussed the past year, the positives of what has happened over the past year of being Turnaround, and I wanted to share some of the feedback with you here.

• We're now open on Thursdays – it's getting busier with 40-45 meals after just a few weeks and some new faces.

- Skills and personal growth more confidence
- Named charity for Rolls Royce Charity Ball in November good promotion for Turnaround.
- More stable than this time last year we've "grown up" a bit.
- Charity has matured things we always wanted to do as the

Methodist Centre is now starting to happen (being a hub, partnership). Come through a time of "chaos" from COVID onwards.

• Tuesday One-Stop-Shop – we can't deliver everything, but by working in this way we can deliver the best possible service to guests.

• We're doing things properly and well, and are a leader in the sector. We're perceived in a different way by the City now – we're part of conversations and have a higher profile now.

- We have a future!
- The opportunities which arise from volunteering.

Great family feel here. Offers a retreat from daily struggle – people can take a breather from whatever people are facing outside.

This is what this place means to us (staff and volunteers), and also what you could experience from volunteering here; a sense of family, a feeling of being part of something big, of bringing change to the City of Bristol and for those who are suffering from homelessness, assisting them in turning their lives around.

This is what you help fund, what you help provide (with donations of food / clothing), this Centre is built brick by brick by you, our loyal supporters.

June 2025 e-newsletter from NHCP for Wesley Guilds and fellowships



#### **Dear Friends**

It's a privilege to be able to share some NHCP news with our loyal supporters. I hope you were able to celebrate Pentecost in some way last Sunday. We have many images to reflect on - dove, wind, fire, wild goose ... all hot on the heels of our Methodist anniversary of Aldersgate when John Wesley's heart was 'strangely warmed.

At NHCP it's also the season to consider how to allocate the funds that you continure to raise for us. When we visited Nigeria in 2023, trustees worked with Nigerian colleagues to develop a new format for annual reports and accounts from places we support. There is space within the reports for our colleagues to write about their plans for the future, as well as all the huge challenges that they face every day.



Deaconess Eunice writes from the Bethesda Orphan Care project that they admitted 15 new orphaned babies in 2024 (9 boys) - these were all successfully sent home in the care of their extended families where they will be followed up project staff until the age of five years. This community-based care has much better otcomes than a traditional orphanage.

Very Rev Ejiga Owen from the mental health centre at Agboke rejoices in the new borehole and water system donated anonymously by one of NHCP's supporters. Owen tells us they assessed 748 new patients of whom 131 required brief admissions for assessment, but they only have six resident homeless patients. This is good community-based mental health care.

The word from Royal Cross Hospital Ugwueke is that, although Dr Hans Corput is no longer a mission partner there (following the very difficult decision by the British Methodist Church to make all lay mission partners redundant in 2024) there is renewed enthusiasm from local donors to build and equip a school of nursing and midwifery. As with the training initiative in the same area (see the March 2025 newsletter), we are seeing examples of wonderful things happening in Nigeria without our direct support, but building on foundations laid by NHCP.



Following a trustees' meeting on 5th June, we have written to the leadership team of Methodist Church to explain that our grants will be reduced this year but we look forward to refreshing our partnership with them. It's not all about money- though thank you very much for your continued and vital support - it's also about fellowship and faith. So many times have our hearts been warmed and inspired by our Nigerian sisters and brothers! We wish you every blessing and will write again in September.
