The people are complaining to Moses about not having access to the type of things they had Egypt. Moses is complaining to God about having to listen to the people complaining. The first thing God tells Moses to do is get some help.

For all the devastation that COVID-19 caused it also caused us to get back into the habit of helping our church members, checking on our neighbors, and ensuring that our communities were well looked after. People did other people's shopping and picked up medication for the most vulnerable. People were concerned when it was reported that children didn't have the necessary technology to do their online schoolwork. All in all, people were lending a helping hand.

But is this still our current mindset? Do we allow things to overwhelm us and not ask for help? Do we sit back and benefit from the labors of others and not offer to lend a helping hand? Ministry was never meant to be a solo enterprise. Hubert H. Humphrey, the 38<sup>th</sup> Vice President of America said, *The impersonal hand of government can never replace the helping hand of a neighbor.* We are the body of Christ, and we are meant to operate and work together.

The Apostle Paul was quite clear in 1 Corinthians 12:15-20, <sup>15</sup> Now if the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. <sup>16</sup> And if

the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body.<sup>17</sup> If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be?<sup>18</sup> But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as God wanted them to be.<sup>19</sup> If they were all one part, where would the body be?<sup>20</sup> As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

We are the Church alive; we are a living breathing entity and the welfare of every member and adherent should be our concern. In our February meeting someone said the circuit has nothing to do with us and I would strongly disagree with that. Whether we see the universal mission of the Church operating Connexional down or local church up we are all one Church and as such should be concerned for all the branches or limbs or body of the Church and not just our little tree stump. Until we see the value in all we cannot see the value in the few.

#### **Dear Friends**

Thank you so much for all your support. For us in the UK, this might be a 'season of mists and mellow fruitfulness', for our friends in Nigeria it is still the rainy season with temperatures hovering just below 30 degrees C in Lagos. It is harvest festival season for us but I have just been reading about the tragic and staggering levels of post-harvest losses of agricultural products in Nigeria - mainly due to lack of storage facilities, appropriate packaging and transport.

This is just one of so many challenges Nigerians face in their day-to-day lives. In the last newsletter, I mentioned the efforts being made at Edawu to generate income (making yam flour locally avoids post-harvest losses) to support their work in rural mental health. This quarter, let's focus on Royal Cross Hospital, Ugwueke, which has often featured in NHCP publicity in the past, mainly due to the pioneering work of Dr Hans Corput, the Dutch mission

partner, who led the development of the hospital to become a beacon of good practice over the last two decades.

Hans tried hard to train and retain Nigerian colleagues to take over from him, but it's difficult to persuade doctors to work in rural areas. Now that Hans has been made redundant (like all the lay mission partners employed by the British Methodist Church) there are no obvious successors to fill his large and hard-working shoes.

In response to a direct appeal, NHCP has sent Royal Cross some infrastructure funding from the estate of Dr Alistair Macdonald - another pioneering doctor in Eastern Nigeria. We thank Hans and his wife Mary (who helped to run the Motherless Babies' Home at Uzuakoli) for all their work.
